
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Letters From Nassau Bahamas 1969-1973

Consequently, I got behind the scenes and learned to know the wonderful people and places of the city not generally explored by tourists. In fact, I took passengers from the ship on paid tours of nightspots such as the Junkanoo, the Cat and the Fiddle, and the Paradise Island Casino. The bartenders and musicians and dancers and cab drivers--I wish I could remember all their names and have space here to mention them. The Junkanoo had a female impersonator who fooled each guest I ever took there. What a delight were the Paradise Island casino, managed by the charming Eddie Cellini, and the huge Show Room where matre d' Freddie watched over things as big named entertainers performed.
